From the archives: match report

Republica 1 - 0 Athletico Bramley
Potternewton Playing Fields, Leeds Combination
League Division 3, 25th Nov 2018

The background: Runaway league leaders Athletico Bramley travelled to Potternewton with a 100% record, winning their first 9 league games of the season including a 3-2 home win over the Reds. Republica had had an inconsistent season with some decent results over their nearest rivals but had in general struggled to heavy defeats against the top teams in the division.

The game: Republica produced their best performance of the 2018/19 season with a narrow win over their guests in a match that was noteworthy for some heroic Republica defending and some bizarre refereeing...

The Reds arguably had the better of the chances in the first half with some good movement in attack, but failed to make it count in the final third. At the other end, Bramley put the ball into the net after the ref had blown for offside as clear-cut chances proved few and far between. The deadlock was broken at the half-hour mark though. After a goal mouth scramble the ball fell to Dan Hickson, on his first appearance in a Republica shirt, who managed to make space between two defenders and find the top corner with a blistering shot from a tight angle.

Half time came and went, and both teams fancied themselves for the victory. With their unbeaten season under threat Bramley piled on the pressure, switching to 4-3-3 while the Reds started the second half unchanged. Not long after the whistle, manager Greg de Boer found himself cautioned by the referee on the sidelines for a reason that's still unclear, and setting the tone for 45 minutes of similar confusion. At 55 minutes, veteran winger Stephen Graham made way for another debutant, Tyrone Leach, as de Boer sought to inject some pace into the Republica side. But the youngster soon found his way into the referees book himself. With an opposing player down on the ground, Jack Smith put the ball out of play so he could receive treatment from the Bramley bench and Leach was penalised for fetching a drink of water from the sidelines.

With half an hour remaining, Nathan Crawley was replaced by Rio Goldhammer at right back as the Reds switched to 5-4-1; Josh Booth dropping into the heart of the defence with Mourad Shoushan taking his place in midfield. The back five wouldn't last too long though. 10 minutes later, Smith, who had picked up a soft yellow for a tackle earlier in the game, was fouled just inside the Republica half. Then, allegedly for gesturing a card to the referee, Smith himself saw a second yellow and Republica were down to 10 players. Before play resumed, with a Republica free-kick from the original foul, there was a further delay as the referee attempted to book a spectator for commenting on this decision.

It was Republica, though, who looked like they might snatch another goal next. Nick Hood came close with a well-struck free kick from 25 yards and Hickson looked as though he'd been awarded a penalty as the end of normal time approached. A ball straight through the middle from Goldhammer sent Hickson through on goal, only to have his legs swept away by the keeper's hands after putting the ball round him. No penalty was given though, and Hickson was given a yellow card for his troubles for a supposed dive.

Bramley came close to an equaliser just before the final whistle but put their last chance past the wrong side of the post. Doggedly, Republica held on through

6 minutes of injury time to bring to close their finest performance of the season. Goalkeeper Matt Joyce was named man-of-the-match for his clean sheet and excellent distribution throughout the game, but every Republica player was able to walk away with pride at a job well done.

What happened next: Republica would go onto struggle in the next few games but improved as the season went on and reached a respectable mid-table finish. The result derailed Bramley's title dreams and they eventually finished third. The two sides met again in the cup in 2020 with Republica comfortably winning 1-0 at Bramley Fall Park.
